CHICANO STUDIES, CERTIFICATE OF ACHIEVEMENT

The Chicano Studies Certificate of Achievement program prepares students to analyze Chicano communities' social relations of power and histories, assess community-formation strategies for Chicanos and utilize social sciences, humanities, community organizing resources, and creative social change to promote social justice and equity, with a particular focus on Chicanos. Successful completion of the program enables students to evaluate and influence institutional and social contexts, using an intersectional approach to race, gender, class, and sexuality. This certificate enhances leadership capacity for students with professional aspirations, enabling them to work with various Chicano communities in various fields such as community organizing, nonprofit organizations, public policy, public service, or business.

Upon successful completion of the program, students will be able to:

- Evaluate the obstacles, strategies, and systems behind Chicano community development and empowerment.
- Apply an intersectional analysis to interrogate Chicano histories and communities to understand community engagement.
- Employ the analytical skills of the social sciences and interpretive methods of the humanities toward promoting greater social justice and equity, with particular emphasis on Chicanos.
